Caribou Coordination Newsletter September 2020

The last few weeks have been extremely busy within the Caribou Coordination Department so I wanted to take an opportunity to provide a brief update that brings all of the information together in one place.

I have included reference to news articles that have covered these developments throughout the below but will note that there have been hundreds of articles across Canada, the U.S. and globally that have been read by millions of people around the world over the last few weeks.

On August 17, 2020, the <u>Record of Decision</u> for the Coastal Plain Oil and Gas Leasing Program was released completing the Environmental Impact Statement Process (the environmental review of the Program). This process was required to be completed before undertaking oil and gas lease sales in the Coastal Plain of the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge as mandated in the 2017 <u>Tax Cuts and Jobs Act</u> passed by the Trump Administration.

The Record of Decision (ROD) adopted Alternative B –the most aggressive and destructive drilling alternative which offers the opportunity to lease the entire Coastal Plain of the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge.

As a final decision from the agency, the Record of Decision is subject to judicial review.

The Gwich'in Steering Committee, representing the Gwich'in Nation of Alaska and Canada, and allied groups are taking the U.S. Secretary of Interior, Department of the Interior, Bureau of Land Management and Fish and Wildlife Service to court for finalizing an illegal leasing program for the Coastal Plain of the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge.

This action is being taken to invalidate the unlawful <u>Final Environmental Impact Statement</u> and <u>Record Of Decision</u>, ANILCA Section 810 Final Evaluation, and deficient <u>Biological Opinion</u>, and any related or subsequent decisions based on those documents. The claims include failure to comply with the <u>Alaska National Interest Lands Conservation Act</u> (ANILCA), the <u>National Environmental Policy Act</u> (NEPA), the <u>Endangered Species Act</u> (ESA) and other federal law and regulations in completing the environmental review processes and in making the final decisions.

Three other lawsuits have been filed since this time. These include one on behalf of Native Village of Venetie Tribal Government, Arctic Village Council, and Venetie Village Council and another on behalf of 15 U.S. States.

In total, the four lawsuits represent 35 different Plaintiffs.

The United Nations Committee of the Elimination of Racial Discrimination (CERD) has <u>called</u> for an investigation regarding how proposed oil and gas development in the Coastal Plain of the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge violates the human rights of the Gwich'in.

This is the first major action by an international human rights body to sound the alarm on the violations to Indigenous Peoples' human rights that will result from drilling in the Arctic Refuge. This investigation comes in response to a request from the Gwich'in Steering Committee and allied groups which highlighted concerns on how development in the Coastal Plain will threaten the way of life of the Gwich'in Nation and violate rights to culture, health, education, employment and security.

A lease sale of the Coastal Plain of the Arctic National Wildlife refuge will require a few steps to be followed before the lease sale date. This will include a public comment period on the specific areas of land to be offered up for lease.

While there is speculation that a lease sale would not proceed before the 2020 U.S. presidential election, there is still a chance that it may proceed any time now and we are ready to respond accordingly. A lease sale could still occur while litigation is ongoing.
